


How to Build an Assembly - Section 14: The Militia Assembly



The Militia functions as a Special Purpose Committee within the Committee of the Whole.

Of all the functions that are most fundamental and most important, it is important for our State Assembly Militias to be and remain "well-regulated" and peaceable. They are not to be formed, used, or deployed in any manner or for any purpose other than defense and common aid in time of disaster or clear and present danger.

Unlike an army, a militia has civilian officers. Also unlike an army, membership in a militia is a birthright. You are born as a member of a state militia. You will also notice that the word "People" in "We, the People" is capitalized.

State Militias are manned by State Citizens who are members of the State Jural Assembly. Similar to the system of the Swiss

Cantons, their focus is community safety and preparedness on a statewide basis. Members are taught firearms safety, marksmanship, first aid, and train in one or more specialties. In the event of attack or natural disaster, the State Militia Commanders can call upon one or more County Militias for assistance. They can also call upon the “State of State” Militias, the State of State “National Guard” and the local U.S. Military Commanders for assistance.

It has come to our attention that there is no longer a universal understanding of our State Militias and their function; as strange as this seems to us, there is a need to explain the traditional role of our Militia Commanders and what they do.

First of all, we don't do Simulation Training Exercises.

Everything that we do is painfully actual and practical. All the jargon and thought paradigms of the professional military are not applicable here. It's the difference between Kansas and the Land of Oz.

Even if we had the resources, we would not choose to establish a hierarchical and compartmentalized command structure with all authority vested in one man or even a handful of men. The great largesse that has been spent on the professional hired military in this country is what has made it possible for them to have and maintain such a structure and to morph it into a large number of similar and supportive structures, such as the “National Guard” which bears no resemblance to our State Militia.

We are building something profoundly different from the intellectualized and dehumanized world of the professional soldiers who have operated as commercial mercenaries for the past 160-plus years.

The way we organize and train a Militia is very different from

what some people are supposing, and our end goal is very different, too.

We will probably never have the kind of equipment and technological advantages that have been afforded to our professional military --- and due to the present “guns or butter” argument, they might not have all the latest toys, either, as we go forward.

What matters is that we go forward together and that a sense of community involvement in peacekeeping and practical skills related to peacekeeping is fostered. A knowledge of Law and Nature is actually more to the point for us.

We are not trying to fill the space of the professional military nor even today's National Guard. When push comes to shove, they actually work for us, and the only struggle is to make them aware of it and enforce their contracts.

Recently, during the aftermath of Hurricane Helene, multiple agencies -- FEMA, CIA, National Guard, etc., -- tried to interfere with our efforts in the storm-ravaged mountains of Western North Carolina and the impacted parts of Eastern Tennessee.

We had these characters drawing guns on us and had local Sheriffs-for-Hire arresting us. They were seizing stockpiles of donated relief supplies. They were impounding our helicopters and excavators. And then, we drew down on them and presented our authority.

It was a near thing, but when convinced that we weren't kidding and that we had the right to do what we were doing, they stood down. They made an about-face and they helped us from then on. Why? Because at the end of the day, they do work for us.

Knowing who you are counts. Acting within your own authority wins. So, learning those two things and having the

inherent courage to assert yourself is crucial.

We kept flying around the clock for 95 days, offloaded an estimated 1400 tons of material and supplies, rescued over 2600 people, 300 pets, and recovered over 1600 cadavers --- and we did that and we financed all of this on donations from other Americans and ourselves.

We did this as volunteers, so there was no cost to nor reliance on the public purse, no labor union contracts to dispute, no red-tape or payola to stand in our way.

We just got ourselves organized and did it.

The role of a Militia Commander is to help us get better organized and prepared to take similar actions in the future, to train us as to our lawful standing, so that we know the Law that applies to us and to our public employees, and also, to build the relationships that allow us to work cooperatively with any other peacekeeping or law enforcement or agency personnel that may be on the ground or in the air.

One of the advantages we have is that a vast number of Americans have served in the professional and semi-professional Armed Forces. It's the silver lining for us.

These men and women know how to organize everything from digging a latrine to building a mobile triage unit. They can build their own airstrips. Construct their own shelter or throw up a community soup kitchen. If they don't have the supplies, they will improvise. If they need a bridge, they will make one. If they don't have the manpower, they'll deputize. Our people are heroes. Every man. Every woman. They came forward from ten States around the disaster area. Many have stayed for the long haul, continuing to show up and help wherever there is need. Think about that.

The Federal Corporation made a complete mess of everything it touched, but our people were there and they didn't miss a

beat. They knew the local people and they knew the weather and the landscape. They were on home turf and they weren't desk-bound bureaucrats coming to "look". They did everything that had to be done.

And then they melted away, went home, until the next time the phone rang.

That's America. That's what this is all about. That's the "value" of a Militia.

And there was no simulation about it, though of course, every time you do something like this it results in a good bit of "training". So, if this kind of rough and ready assessment on the ground kind of action isn't what you were expecting from a Militia, well, sorry, that's what it is. And has always been. Authority does not come from rank, but from knowledge, willingness to serve, and heart.

We have worked in many emergency situations over the course of our lifetimes, including the Miller's Reach Wildfire that burned down our house. We have always been amazed how you can take a motley group of men who just showed up and within minutes, they will have sorted themselves out into something that can work. Within a few hours of doing anything, the leaders emerge -- and these leaders are accepted on an instinctive level. It's like a wolf pack creating its own dynamic and it is different for every group.

This natural process that is guided by the tasks at hand is what is natural to a Militia. You have a rushing torrent to cross. How are you going to cross it?

You have a dead body hung up on a snarl of downed trees in the middle of a flooding river. How are you going to recover that cadaver?

You have three little kids and a dog in the path of a wildfire and the wind is picking up. There's a deep ravine on one side

and a swamp on the other. What do you do? How brave and resourceful are you?

You've got fifty people who are suddenly homeless and cold and hungry --- how are you going to get them to safety, feed them, and provide them shelter?

You have twelve homesteaders trapped on a stretch of road above a washed-out bridge. How are you going to get them out and get food and drink to them in the meantime?

If Militias have to fight, they have to be ready to do that, too.

But as guerrillas, they are not and never were any good at formal engagements. Sharp shooters are key to militia defense schools. It's not how much lead, it is always where you can put the lead that counts in a militia.

So, you can't rely upon equipment or amount of force. You have to hone skills and rely on individual initiative. How do you take out a drone or a bot? How do you stop a tank? What diversions work? What supply lines can be cut? Can you jury-rig a homemade cannon? How many different fuel sources can you identify? How quietly can you move through dry brush?

Militias, properly trained and motivated, are stronger than their moving parts, and the members bond tight. They rely on their ability to think, to perform, and to adapt to whatever comes at them.

Again, it's a very free-flowing, unscripted, and perhaps you would say, undisciplined fighting style, but properly learned and taught, it can be like Kung Fu--very powerful and precise, using the Enemy's power against him --- whatever the Enemy's power is.

We have some wonderful militia commanders in this country. It's our intention to get some of them out this summer and fall to teach classes and inspire everyone.

Everyone gains from participating in the State Militia --- whether its basic First Aid and Lifesaving Skills, camping, swimming, or how to poop in the woods. Militia work should be at once serious-minded, and fun. Militia can engage and encompass a very wide range of skill development.

How do you cook outdoors? How do you cook undetected? How do you build a rocket stove? What can you use to make a cistern? Good quick recipes for canning meat?

You see? Everything from learning to make candles to brining fish is fair game for a State Militia and the role of the Militia Commander has to move and shift from aprons to overhauls to camouflage jacket and back again, through all the seasons of the year, because the militia function is that basic and that fluid.

You might sponsor once a month trips to the shooting range and go every weekend with a different age group of volunteers. You might sponsor a series of group camp outs with small groups and then gradually add groups together to practice putting together soup kitchens, latrines, triage units, large tents, make-do shelters from onsite materials.

You might sponsor foraging classes -- learn your common mushrooms and fungi and other forest edibles. Militia is about surviving and helping others survive. Study medicinal plants and engage the gardeners in your militia to plant and learn how to harvest medicinal plants.

Our Forefathers engaged a huge array of practical skills as part of their militias. Women and men knew how to make gunpowder and cast bullets. Everyone had root cellars and knew how to use them. Everyone knew how to use hand tools. Everyone knew practical knots. Everyone knew how to jerk meat. Most everyone, both men and women, knew how to sew and knit. How to make cheese.

This kind of practical skill development is the job of a Militia Commander, too. It might not be the common idea of what a “Militia Commander” does, but in our tradition, a Militia Commander has to embrace the whole spectrum of life.

This is intended to provide at least a basic idea of what goes on in a traditional State Militia. Like so many other things, we have to relearn from scratch the useful skills our fathers had, as well as the skills of the modern world -- computer inventories and spreadsheets for supply control, organization of digital and hard copy records, budgets, technical gear, provisions, and on and on.

A militia has to learn the skills and “content” of every member and be able to deploy that whole range of skills and knowledge.

It's a big job, but it can be a deeply rewarding job, because you are part of a team that is capable of defending your State and your people from a wide range of circumstances. Power grid goes out? Need potable water? You will have answers and equipment, ready to go, if you have a good State Militia.

Remember our goal as a government --- to first, last, and always protect the people and their property.

While some of us labor in the realm of the spirit and the mind, research the history, and know the Laws and the Statutes, the Militias handle the practical end of things. Militias build the roads and guard the crossings, fill the kit bags, and post the warnings.

If a government or a government subcontractor (in the case of the Federales) fails the basic mission of all governments --- that is, to protect the people and their property --- that organization has no valid reason to exist.

Stop a moment and think deeply about this. If your government isn't doing all that it can to protect you and your

property, so as to improve the quality and security and enjoyment of your life and property, that government has failed.

It takes only a tiny bit more consideration to fully realize the importance of a well-run, or in the words of the Federal Constitutions, “well-regulated” State Militia. Your State Assembly Militia is guaranteed to you and is your means to physically and materially preserve your lives and property in the face of lawlessness, natural disaster, and even invasion.

Evil men acting in Breach of Trust unlawfully converted your State Assembly Militias into “National Guards” and then they redefined the word “National” so as to bring these resources under their own control --- leaving you and your communities and your States of the Union without organized protection.

This has also led to the abuse of the National Guards, who have been deployed to foreign venues and used as cheap replacements for the regular Armed Services.



Civilian Militias From Article [3994](#)

Civilian militias are as old as Mankind. They are us, when we band together to face common dangers, deal with outlaws, survive natural disasters, and defend against invaders.

That's why the word "militia" means "people" in Hebrew.

So, there is nothing improper or unknown or dangerous about civilian militias. **They are here to protect hearth, home, and community at the most basic, natural, and obvious level.**

This is why our republican States of the Union are guaranteed the right to keep and maintain a "well-regulated militia".

Read that: we are responsible for keeping our State Militia forces well-trained and educated so that they know their role and don't trespass; otherwise, we are absolutely guaranteed the right and ability to create and maintain our own State militia.

So, what happened to our State militias?

They were "redefined" (are you noticing a pattern here?) as "National Guards".

Their command was placed under a foreign "State of State" Governor, instead of our State Assembly Chairman, and many of their functions were merged into the conventional military and butted up against the Pinkerton System of private security personnel represented by FBI, BATF, and similar armed Agency subcontractors.

Things have gotten so bad in recent years that "our" unlawfully converted State Militias redefined as "National Guards" have been used to replace the official military, because they are cheaper to deploy.

Thus, we are greeted with the bizarre reality of "State" National

Guards, who were never authorized nor intended to act beyond the borders of their home States of the Union, fighting in Afghanistan and Iraq, under the command of a foreign corporation's "President".

There is absolutely no authority in existence anywhere permitting the President of the foreign US, INC. or USA, Inc. corporations to maintain any such "National Guard" force in our country. None.

As presently deconstructed, these "National Guard" units that are supposed to represent/replace our State Militias, are illegal foreign mercenary forces and there is no contract, consensual agreement, treaty, or granted authority allowing their existence in their present form.

There is no provision for a foreign mercenary force to exist on American soil. Zero.

The obvious answer that Mr. Trump and Company is searching for, has already been given to them. They can return the National Guard to the command of the State Assembly Chairmen, or they can dissolve it and let us assume responsibility for "regulating" and reorganizing and educating the National Guard units into proper State Militias.

As for the need for a lawful county level force, there is already the "Grand Army of the Republic" commissioned in the wake of the Civil War; this civilian force includes county level units throughout the Northern and Southern States and is organized under the sovereign powers of the States of the (Original) Union. It can be fully and lawfully deployed and supplied in less than two weeks.

This is an action that I suggested to President Trump early in his tenure, but as subsequent history has demonstrated, he was not interested in activating and using the power of the people of this country. He has maintained the British Territorial fraud in our midst, the so-called "American Raj",

and been instrumental in promoting “Operation Warp Speed” --- DARPA's prototype depopulation program by any other name.

Whether Republican or Democrat, the Agenda is the same--- whatever the UN CORPORATION wants, the UN CORPORATION gets, and God help us all correct this situation as quickly as possible.

If and when a larger force of combined State-level Militias is needed, it's simple enough to put such a force together, but the nature of a State Militia is to function entirely and exclusively within the borders of their State of the Union.

The nation they are intended to guard are the people of each State, not any visiting Federal “nation” representing employees of foreign corporations that are only allowed to be here by the [Residency Act of 1790](#) for the purpose of providing “essential government services”. See the [Act](#) and see the Constitution(s) at [Article IV](#).

Civilian militias have functioned forever in every country on Earth, and all of them are attached to the land and soil jurisdiction --- except for Britain.

We forget amid the ever-touted glories of England, that Britain made and still makes a large portion of its income from privateers and the management of privateers by the British Navy.

Benedict's treatise on Admiralty Law reveals that the King's “civilian militia” include foreign-station officers, Bar Attorneys, who manage the cargo and disputes related to the privateering, collect tariffs, taxes, duties, and confiscation of property, impoundments, salvage claims and similar activities all over the world.

That is, unlike all other countries, Britain's “civilian militia” is not attached to the land and soil, and is used as a foreign

mercenary service -- the Bar Association -- to perform these services for the King, under contract, on a worldwide basis. One of the oldest definitions of a “bar attorney” that has come to light is “a shipping clerk or patent agent engaged in foreign trade or commerce”.

Bingo. And true to custom, they have been impounding American cargos and shipping American resources and manpower all over the world in behest of the war-mongers occupying the British Government ever since 1901.

Britain's “civilian militia” also includes licensed Medical Doctors (as opposed to Private Physicians) who universally outrank the Judges and Bar Attorneys --- so it is impossible for a lower ranking officer (Judge) to condemn a higher ranking officer (Medical Doctor) in the same civilian militia service.

This is why the Coroner, a Medical Doctor, is the only one who can administratively remove a Territorial State-of-State Governor from office.

This is why attempts to bring the doctors who have killed millions of innocent people to justice in British Maritime courts are doomed to failure. It's not that they haven't committed crimes. It isn't that they don't deserve to be hung for medical profiteering resulting in genocide. It's the fact that the court is incompetent to try these genocide-for-profit monsters.

The same provisions are built into British Territorial Federal Code, at [Title V](#) and [Title XI](#) and especially at [Title XXXVII](#) covering “Uniformed Officers”.

The only courts in their system that can bring the King's civilian militia to justice are military courts acting under the Uniform Code of Military Justice, and Naval Courts Martial operating on the High Seas or Navigable Inland Waterways.

My suggestion is that they build court barges offshore and in the Great Lakes for the express purpose of conducting trials.

Of course, our land and soil courts can address them as foreign criminals caught in the act of committing murder within the borders of our counties and States of the Union, but it has taken time for lawfully declared American State Assemblies to stand up their courts -- an urgent necessity that is currently being addressed in all fifty States.

We are not at war --- commercial mercenary "war" or otherwise, however, our civilian population is being inappropriately addressed as "combatants" in the midst of this illegal endangerment posed by our misdirected federal (contract) employees.

Over 270,000 "excess" American deaths have occurred as a result of activities by DARPA and the DOD Municipal Government Agencies acting under direction from their parent corporation, the UN CORPORATION.

This is unacceptable in the extreme and will be prosecuted as both commercial and actual crime.

None of our people are "excess" in the view of the lawful American Government.

Strong Militia Over Standing Armies - Important lessons from the Founders on the right to keep and bear arms One of the primary reasons the founders wanted a strong militia system with a well-armed general public was to minimize or even eliminate the need for a large, permanent standing army, even in times of peace.

Most people in the founding generation were extremely wary of standing armies. They were often referred to as “the bane of liberty.”

They knew this from experience. From the standing armies that led to the massacre in Boston, to the gun control scheme that kicked off the war for independence – they lived it firsthand. As colonial resistance to taxes and other policies grew in 1774, the British responded by attempting to disarm the colonists.

Noah Webster understood this danger well, saying,

“Before a standing army can rule, the people must be disarmed.”

George Mason also minced no words.

“I abominate and detest the idea of a government, where there is a standing army.”

St George Tucker warned what would happen if there was a standing army and the people were disarmed:

“This may be considered the true palladium of liberty. ... The right of self-defense is the first law of nature: in most governments it has been the study of rulers to confine this right within the narrowest limits possible. Wherever standing armies are kept up, and the right of the people to keep and bear arms is, under any color or pretext

whatsoever, prohibited, liberty, if not already annihilated, is on the brink of destruction.”

This is why so many in the founding generation favored a strong militia system.

Patrick Henry summed it up during the Virginia ratifying convention.

“The militia, sir, is our ultimate safety. We can have no security without it.”

Why did the founders trust the militia and not a standing army? Because as George Mason said, the militia consists of “the whole people, except a few public officers.”

In other words, the people ultimately maintain control over the militia. In fact, they are the militia. But the government controls a standing army. It effectively serves as an extension of the government.

Henry Knox served as the first secretary of war in the U.S., and he recognized this distinction. In a letter to George Washington sharing his plan for organizing the militia dated 18 Jan. 1790, he emphasized that the militia should provide the primary defense and a standing army was distinct from the people at large.

“An energetic national militia is to be regarded as the Capital security of a free republic; and not a standing army, forming a distinct class in the community.”

He went on to say that

“whatever may be the efficacy of a standing army in war, it cannot in peace be considered as friendly to the rights of human nature.”

Knox reflected a broadly-held view in the founding generation. People generally acknowledged the need for a standing army during times of war. Some even recognized the utility of a small standing army in times of peace. But virtually everybody understood standing armies posed a danger in peacetime. The militia served as an alternative – a first line of defense.

This view shaped the drafting of the militia clause at the Philadelphia Convention.

George Mason brought up the subject of federal regulation of the militia, saying he

“hoped there would be no standing army in time of peace unless it might be for a few garrisons. The militia ought therefore to be the more effectually prepared for public defence.”

Mason conceded that “an absolute prohibition of standing armies in times of peace might be unsafe.” So, desiring to point out and guard against their danger, he moved to preface the militia clause by adding the words

“And that the liberties of the people may be better secured against the danger of standing armies in times of peace.”

This language wasn’t ultimately included in the Constitution, but it shows the thinking of the framers as they were drafting the Constitution, and underscores their widely-held worries about a standing army.

Even Alexander Hamilton acknowledged this point in Federalist #29, writing,

“If standing armies are dangerous to liberty, an efficacious power over the militia, in the body to whose care the protection of the state is committed, ought, as far as possible, to take away the inducement and the pretext to such an unfriendly situation.

To render an army unnecessary, will be a more certain method of preventing its existence than a thousand prohibitions upon paper.”

During the Philadelphia Convention, James Madison also argued that a good militia would minimize or even prevent the need for standing armies.

“As the greatest danger to liberty is from large standing armies, it is best to prevent them by an effectual provision for a good militia.”

This drives home the point that the reason for having a well-armed populace isn’t just for shooting deer, or for personal defense, or even for defending against foreign enemies. The founding generation believed it was necessary to reduce the need for a standing army.

When Thomas Jefferson first read a copy of the proposed Constitution, he urged James Madison to provide for “the substitution of militia for a standing army”.

During the Virginia ratifying convention, the question came up as to why the general government was given the power to call forth the militia. Madison emphasized that

“if insurrections should arise, or invasions should take place, the people ought to unquestioningly be employed, to suppress and repel them, rather than a standing army.”

This reiterated the point he made during the Philadelphia Convention.

“The best way to do these things is to put the militia on a good and sure footing, and enable the government to make use of their services when necessary.”

He went on to argue that “the most effectual way to guard against a standing army is to render it unnecessary.”

How do you do that?

“Give the general government full power to call forth the militia, and exert the whole natural strength of the Union, when necessary.”


Tench Coxe also argued for a strong militia in order to mitigate the need for a standing army. He said,

“The militia, who are in fact the effective part of the people at large, will render many troops quite unnecessary.”

During the Virginia Ratifying Convention, James Monroe gave perhaps the best summary of the importance of the well-armed militia.

“All countries are more or less exposed to danger, either from insurrection or invasion and the greater the authority of Congress over this respectable body of men, in whose hands everything would be safe, the less necessity there would be, to have recourse to the bane of all societies, the destroyer of the rights of men, a standing army.”

In Closing

Militia Assembly Committees

Militia Special Purpose Committee Membership

Committee – evaluates candidates and vets them for specific jobs within the Assembly Militia, seeks to encourage participation in the Militia, understanding of the Militia’s role, and support of the Militia’s functions.

Provisions Committee – acts as the Quartermaster for the Militia, evaluates needs and means to meet those needs for equipment and other provisions needed to carry out Militia duties.

Education Committee – develops tests and educational materials and programs to train Militia members.

Operations Committee – develops short and long-term operational goals for the State Assembly Militia, creates plans to implement projects and goals, evaluates Militia readiness, acts as oversight for the Militia, works with the Ombudsman’s Office to resolve complaints related to the Militia and Militia Service, works with the Peacekeeping Task Force to coordinate joint operations, when appropriate, with Constitutional Sheriffs and with Continental Marshals Service personnel.

Officers

Militia Commander

It is extremely important that our Militia Commanders be cool-headed, prudent, and devoted men of experience, possessing a true understanding of our American Government, and our State Militias' place within that government.

The leader of the State Assembly Militia has the responsibility of coordinating and implementing State-level deployment of assistance to local counties and participating in interstate rescue and relief efforts.

The role of a Militia Commander is to help us get better organized and prepared to take similar actions in the future, to train us as to our lawful standing, so that we know the Law that applies to us and to our public employees, and also, to build the relationships that allow us to work cooperatively with any other peacekeeping or law enforcement or agency personnel that may be on the ground or in the air.

One of the advantages we have is that a vast number of Americans have served in the professional and semiprofessional Armed Forces. It's the silver lining for us.

These men and women know how to organize everything from digging a latrine to building a mobile triage unit. They can build their own airstrips. Construct their own shelter or throw up a community soup kitchen. If they don't have the supplies, they will improvise. If they need a bridge, they will make one. If they don't have the manpower, they'll deputize. Our people are heroes. Every man. Every woman.

This kind of practical skill development is the job of a Militia Commander, too. It might not be the common idea of what a "Militia Commander" does, but in our tradition, a Militia Commander has to embrace the whole spectrum of life.

Elected/Appointed

The Militia Commander is an elected position. They are required to serve in good faith as a State Citizen.

Requirements

- ◆ Ability to stay calm, cool and collected in chaotic and dangerous situations
- ◆ Knowledge of public safety procedures
- ◆ Firearm competency
- ◆ Tactical skills
- ◆ Communication skills that include the ability to diffuse chaotic situations
- ◆ The means to travel easily to disaster areas
- ◆ Lifesaving skills
- ◆ Works well with a variety of other specialists including LEO's, Fire Department, etc.

Qualities of a good Militia Commander

Can remain calm no matter how chaotic the situation

Is a good organizer

Is able to communicate clearly

Maintains composure and poise in difficult situations

Is well-trained in self-defense, community protection and arms use

Is well versed in first aid and emergency procedures

Can work well on a team with other LEO's, Fire Department, and Emergency Response Teams

Marshal at Arms (Pillar Option)



The Marshal at Arms ensures the safety and decorum at all meetings and events, providing safety and security of the meeting place itself and the people at the meeting.

He or she trains others to handle the security of all the Pillar and the people who work in that Pillar capacity for the Assembly.

He or she cares for the flag and works with the Elections Committee to secure ballots.

A Pillar level Marshal works with the State Marshals at Arms as a collective. Or, think of it this way: every pillar level Marshal at Arms becomes part of a state level team or “committee of the Whole, Marshal at Arms” for which the State Marshal at Arms acts as “chair”. The Marshals all work together, sometimes even with the Federation Marshals to handle larger security issues.

Don't mistake a land jurisdiction Marshal at Arms for their Sea-going counterpart! Our guys are not Naval Officers or part of any Territorial Service.

Land Jurisdiction Marshals, employed by the State Assemblies work together with their own State Militia leaders to ensure safety for the Assembly. They also network with local Sheriffs and other Peacekeeping officers and LEO's.

There are County level Marshals whose interest is local and centered on security for County Assembly meetings and events. They interact with the Sheriff and other Peacekeeping officers, but also may call upon the Continental Marshals if there is a problem concerning international issues.

Elected/Appointed

The Marshal at Arms position may be elected or hired. In either case they are required to serve in good faith and adopt American State National or State Citizen status as condition of employment.

Requirements

- ◆ Knowledge of public safety procedures
- ◆ Firearm competency
- ◆ Communication skills that include the ability to diffuse heated situations
- ◆ The means to travel easily to areas requiring protection (a working car for example)

Qualities of a good Marshal at Arms

Is a natural protector

Is strong without being egotistical

Is patient and not easily triggered

Knows how to deescalate situations

Maintains composure and poise in difficult situations

Remains neutral and unbiased

Is well-trained in self-defense, community protection and arms use

Can work well on a team with other Marshals when necessary

Meeting Moderator



The meeting moderator's job is to open and close the meeting and ensure that the agenda is followed. The moderator acts as a neutral party ensuring that all voices are heard as is appropriate in the context of the meeting. The moderator works with the Marshal at Arms to enforce any participation guidelines that have been set. A good meeting moderator speaks very little other than to keep the meeting on point and guide the discussions back to the items on the agenda.

Elected/Appointed

The meeting moderator is elected by the General Assembly and if necessary, can be removed by a simple vote.

Eligibility

The Moderator can be either a American State National or an American State Citizen.

Qualities of a Good Moderator

Is fair and impartial when giving people time to speak

Remains neutral during meeting discussions

Can remain calm when things get heated and knows how to deescalate situations

Exercises restraint when speaking and does not dominate a meeting

Sets good boundaries and conduct for the meeting

Will assist the Marshal at Arms in enforcing them

Pillar Chairs - One for each of the Four Pillars

The Chairman or Chairwoman acting as Spokesperson for the International Business Assembly occupies the same role as the General Assembly Chairman, only on behalf of the smaller, more specialized International Business Assembly.



The Chairpersons or Directors don't get to pick and choose who is a member of the International Business Assembly or the Militia or the Jural Assembly.

In our Government there is no positional authority, only functional authority.

Offices are functions and those holding them are functionaries in our system of government; they have the right and responsibility to do the job they have been elected to do, but they did not, like the Pigs in Animal Farm, become "more equal" than anyone else by virtue of being elected.

As such, those we entrust with the duties of office, are constrained to protect the individual rights of every member of the group and cannot secure for themselves any special authority apart from the duties and customs of their office.

The Chairman or Chairwoman of the International Business Assembly is simply a Spokesperson for the International Business Assembly as a whole. They don't get to pick and choose who can be a State Citizen, nor do they get to pick and choose which State Citizens take an interest in the IB Assembly and shoulder the work.

The leader of the State Assembly Militia has the responsibility of coordinating and implementing State-level deployment of assistance to local counties and participating in interstate rescue and relief efforts. They did not die, become God, and rule as emperors over all they survey.

The Chairman of the Jural Assembly is responsible for organizing the Courts, Jury Pools, and working with the Elections Committee to conduct elections for Justices and other Court Offices. The Chairman may also ramrod educational programs about the Common Law we practice and other topics of interest. The character of their office is that of an executive administrator. They aren't here to lord it over anybody; like the rest of us, they are here to get a job done.

Pillar Secretary



The Pillar Secretary is responsible for taking minutes at the Assembly meetings and assisting the Moderator/Chair with administrative tasks, overseeing records and archives returned by the Assembly.

Elected/Appointed

This position is elected by the General Assembly based on character and skills. The Assembly Secretary keeps and manages the Agenda and oversees all other records and archives retained by the Assembly.

Eligibility

The Assembly Secretary serves in good faith and is elected by and can be removed by a simple vote of the Assembly.

This position is more of a traditional Secretarial/Archivist job than the Recorders, SIA Coordinators or Court Clerks.

The Secretary keeps the Agenda and the Minutes and/or transcripts or recordings, oversees archives returned by the Assembly Pillar, oversees and organizes reference books,

instructional videos and educational materials.

The Secretary can also assist with drafting contracts and agreements.

The Secretary can stand in as the Chair if the Assembly Chair is sick or absent and can chair meetings of the IB Assembly if need be.

Qualities of a good Secretary

Takes great notes!

Has good word processing skills

Is good at organizing information

Is easy to work with

Record Keeper



The Record Keeper holds a very important position in the Assembly by safeguarding our records for not only our own use, but for the benefit of all historians of the future! We are making history here, and it is important that everything be documented and saved. They need to be very trustworthy because they will have direct access to all members personal information.

Called by various names, the Assembly Record Keepers work with the elected Assembly Secretary to log, organize and securely archive digital, audio, or paper records created and returned by the Assembly.

As the Assembly develops a library and archive for

historical documents, one or more Record Keepers may be tasked as the Pillar Assembly Archivist or Pillar Assembly Librarian.

County level Record Keepers maintain the records for their county. State Record Keepers maintain a duplicate copy of all records from all counties on their state. So yes, there are two copies of everything... just in case!

The Record Keeper maintains neat, organized and easy to find records of the following:

- ◆ Paper copies of all status correction documents (with the exception of birth certificates) including baby deeds.
- ◆ Paper copies of all meeting minutes
- ◆ Digital copies of all meeting recordings

It is recommended that a very safe place be allocated for record keeping. When starting out on a county, a single fire proof file cabinet may be all you need for a while. And if it is a lockable cabinet stored in a secured home, that could be just fine. But as you grow, you may require a large space such as a fireproof vault or highly secure storage facility.

Elected/Appointed

The Record Keeper is an American State National or State Citizen position elected by the Assembly.

Eligibility

The position of Record Keeper, whether at the state or county level, is an American State National or State Citizen position.

Other Requirements

- ◆ File cabinet(s), preferably fire proof, stored in a secure area
- ◆ Computer with backup for storage of digital information

- ◆ Printer

Qualities of a good Record Keeper

Trustworthy

Extremely organized

Doesn't mind filing... lots of filing!

Has room to store multiple file cabinets

Treasury/Banking



The Treasury/Banking Committee handles the financial needs of the Militia Assembly Pillar, collecting and depositing any funds received, distributing outgoing payments and maintaining an accurate and up-to-date ledger. Men and women are vetted to be signatories on the Assembly's bank account for funds distribution throughout the State. The Pillar Treasury/Banking Team works with the State and County level teams.

Elected/Appointed

This is a State Citizen position elected by the Militia Assembly and requires professional knowledge and competency to do the job in good faith.

Requirements

- ◆ Knowledge of how to keep a ledger, whether on paper or via software
- ◆ Knowledge of **carriage accounting**, (simple ins and outs) contrary to double accrual accounting used by corporations.

Qualities of a good Treasurer

Trustworthy

Diligent

Good with numbers

Maintain current numbers

Understands basic principles of carriage accounting (ins and outs)

Is timely with all deposits and disbursements
